GPLN Veterinary Clinician 1974 to 1996

Dr. Barnhart passed away on December 14, 2020.

"I first met Dr. Barnhart in 1983 as a young veterinarian and new employee with the Georgia Poultry Improvement Association in Tifton Georgia. 

IN MEMORY OF JESSIE SPARKS

"Mrs. Sparks started working at the lab in 1988. Her husband, Ron, was the lab's accountant. Jessie worked in 'transfer' where Mycoplasma and Pullorum serological testing was done. The Mycoplasma testing was by plate agglutination. It was called 'transfer' because for the pullorum test they had to transfer the serum from the blood tube to a tube where antigen would be added for the test. Jessie was in charge of paperwork. She made sure all the results were summarized and loaded into the computer (yes, we actually had computers back then).

She was a kind, sweet lady and very competent in what she did. During the 2000's there were issues with the Mycoplasma plate antigens and we made the switch to ELISA. Jessie took the new techniques in stride and continued until she and her husband retired in 2005. Everyone who had the privilege to work with her still have such fond memories of Ms. Jessie."
